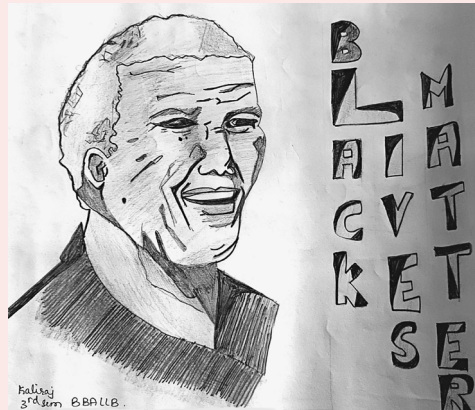
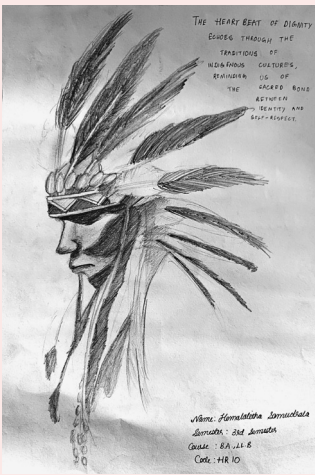
8th December, 2023: Pencil Sketch Competition

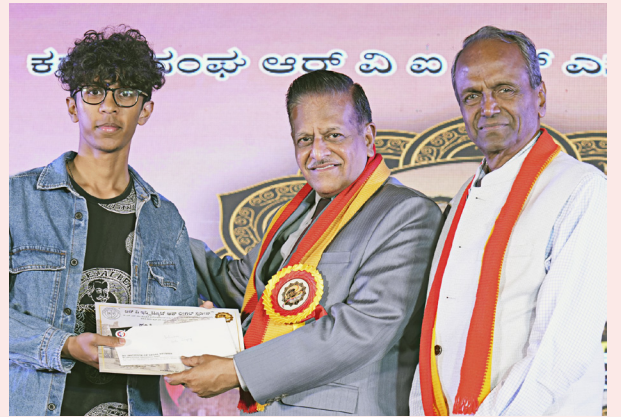
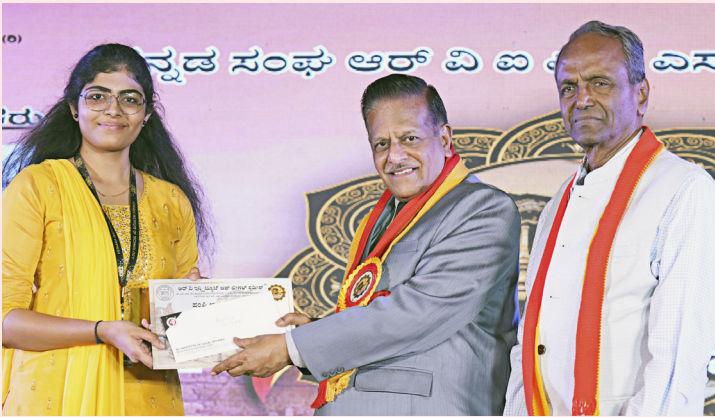
17th Feburary,2024: Valedictory Programme of Hampi Utsav 2024

Right to Life and Dignity: Protecting Rights of the Deceased, a Crucial Civic Responsibility



"In the midst of death life persists. In the midst of untruth, truth persists. In the midst of darkness, light persists".

It is the duty of every human being to regard and respect death of another living being as the most significant duty. An Indian lawyer, a prominent politician and the chief architect of Swaraj, self rule of his motherland, Father of our Nation, Mahatma Gandhiji, states the above words with the deep sense that truth and light are the vital components of life that outshadow the deepest darkness and death must be valued to value life of a person. It is crucial for the current generation to understand and interpret the importance of protecting the Constitutional and statutory rights of deceased persons which is the main objective behind my small piece of writing.

The Right to timely and decent burial is an implied fundamental right as enshrined under Article 21 of the Honourable Constitution of our nation concerning the Right to life and personal liberty, also as laid in the case of Ashray Adhikar Abhiyan v. Union of India in 2002. The same has been repeatedly emphasized in various other Supreme Court and High Court judgements giving this right a strong judicial support.

In various International Conventions as in International Convention for Civil and Political Rights (Article 6), Cairo Declaration on Human Rights Article 3(a), Geneva Convention on International Humanitarian Law (Article 16 and article 130(1)), UN's Inter Agency Standing Committee's Operational Guidelines on Human Rights and Natural Disasters (Article 6) and so on have emphasized on protection to Rights and dignity of the dead persons.

There lies an integral civic responsibility due to the Democratic system of our country, especially the youth, to take rational and structural measures towards strengthening the Rights of dead persons irrespective of cast or creed and also ensure performance of last rites and post cremation or post burial rites of the deceased with utmost attention and respect.

The same can be ensured by building a strong and robust mechanism in the implementation of the various legal aspects and inculcating strategic and equitable measures.

The approaches and ideas of the youth of today are comparatively flexible that must also extend to performance of last rites even by daughters of the deceased parents like the same performed by a famous celebrity anchor in the recent past so that parents of India without sons do not have to worry about their last rites.

Various strategic and holistic approaches that can be adopted in this arena :

- Ensuring 24x7 helpline to avail ambulance services even to remote and rural regions
- Digitization of data, maintenance of digital records of deceased persons' details, availability of burial and cremation grounds, electric crematoriums.
- Eviction of encroachment of burial grounds and fencing them further.
- Reservation of lands of construction of burial and cremation grounds.
- Non discrimination in disposal of unclaimed and unidentified dead bodies.
- Ensuring active role of the Municipal and Police authorities in ensuring legal and safe disposal of dead bodies of all genders.
- Ascertaining on Ensuring donations for such purposes by NGOs and Corporate Sectors (as a CSR activity).
- Systematic post mortem and forensic procedures must be abided in case of unnatural death, especially suicide cases.
- Max Weber, a prominent jurist and sociologist had stated that a common burial ground is crucial for an ideal society and the safest be adopted to avail burial grounds available to people of all caste in the society, as in every religion on this planet, the deceased is regarded as the divine.

- Also there must be stringent measures in the maintenance of hygiene in the burial and cremation sites.
- An authorized officer or a regulator must be appointed to maintain the place of burial or cremation.
- Electric crematorium use must be encouraged to combat the lack of availability of burial ground in rural and urban regions.
- Abiding by the choice of disposal of the deceased if informed previously to family, friends, relatives or legal representatives.
- Ensuring availability of firewood for burial, earthen pots, water, garlands and other such articles for the performance of rituals in rural and urban regions.

Many other measures can be adopted in view of protecting and upholding the rights of the dead in order to safeguarding the environment.

Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri, the first posthumous recipient of the highest civilian award, Bharat Ratna Award that was given after his death along with Loknayak Jayaprakash Narayan, Shri Maulana Abdul Kalam must be observed to understand the respect given to the continuous light given by them to the world even after their death.

Nirbhaya, the fearless woman who fought for her life valiantly in the Delhi rape case is been awarded the International Woman of Courage Award by the American Government to her mother, after death of Nirbhaya in regard of her deep struggle to face her medical complications with extreme courage to overcome death.

The various rights that are protected by adopting the above measures are :

- The Right to Decent and Timely Burial or Cremation as an implied fundamental right under Article 21 of the Constitution.
- Religious and Cultural rights of the deceased, his family and legal representatives under Article 25 to 28.
- Right to clean environment by way of ensuring safe disposal of dead bodies, that is also an implied right under Article 21.
- Ensure non discrimination of the dead person protecting the right to equality under Article 14.
- Medico legal rights of deceased persons, especially in cases of death after medical complications.
- Statutory rights against defamation as given under the Bhartiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023.
- Double protection of statutory rights against commercial dealings of organs and illegal treatment of dead body as given in Transplantation of Human Organs and Tissues Act, 1994.
- Other measures such as :
- Filing Public Interest Litigations in view of protecting the fundamental rights under Articles 14 to protect the right to equality, Article 21 to ensure timely and decent burial or cremation of the dead persons and Article 25 – 28 to protect the right to freedom of religion.
- Organising awareness campaigns in collaboration with NGOs.
- Liberalising travel policies for people staying in other states and countries to come to place of death of parents to perform last rites.
- Active role of the Central and State Governments in formulating and implementing laws and policies explicitly for purpose of decent burial and cremation of the deceased persons.
- Provision to make rules by executive authorities of must be availed to ensure robust mechanism in ensuring the protection of the above rights and impose strict penalties for violation of the law as strong laws for this purpose are not found in the regional laws of any state of our country.
- Laws of other countries such as, Scotland, Laws of U.K., U.S.A, Australia can be observed to inculcate strong provisions.

The fundamental duty under the Constitution to strive for excellence [Article 51 A (j)] and the civic responsibility of each and every person living in this land of culture and diversity to protect the cultural and religious values. I dream and urge that the International Human Rights Day this year, must be celebrated with pride, with emphasis on building a strong mechanism in the protection of the various rights of the dead and his kith and kin.

The laws in this regard must aim to make a Secular State free from caste based discrimination in this aspect of human rights thereby fostering an environment for a Welfare State, the main ideal of the Constitution of our Nation. The right to life must be made equal to right to dignity of a deceased person.

Gender Budgeting: A Key for Women Empowerment



To a human, lack of proper opportunities, resources or financial independence can lead to violence, harassment, dependency, prejudice, social, politics, religious discrimination, etc. Hence, budgets are prepared in order to maintain order in an economy, a concept under the vast budget is gender budgeting. Gender budgeting is discussed to address these shortcomings. This is to portray the concept of gender budgeting as a means of mainstreaming a gender perspective at various stages of planning, budget implementation impact and program objectives and its allocation review.

In this gender structure, research is conducted to organise capacity building activities to include women empowerment along with gender equality. The scheme of Gender Budgeting was subsumed from the financial year 2017-18 in the Research, Publications and Monitoring Scheme.

Preparing budgets or analysing them from a gender perspective aiming to deal with budgetary gender inequality issues is called Gender Budgeting. Being a feminist policy at its core, its goal is to advocate for an advanced decision-making role for women in important issues, and securing equity in the distribution of resources between men and women.

Purpose

Gender budgeting's main purpose is to promote accountability and transparency in fiscal planning. By integrating gender budget concepts into budget planning that helps the government in understanding well how different policies and systems of the budget impact men and women differently.

Generally, gender factor is not considered while preparing budgets assuming that the budget's impact is gender neutral, but studies show that this lack of attention to gender factors leads to gender blind budgets and thus negligible decision making. Most importantly, gender budgeting is to ensure the government uses public resources in a way to increase gender equality and to increase effectiveness and efficiency of all the policies of the budget.

Gender budgeting is implemented in order to enable achievement of gender equity and equality. So that the policies of the budget system in our country can benefit both the genders without any discrimination. South Indian Mother



Hallikar is a breed of cattle native to the state of Karnataka India. It derives its name from Hallikar community which is traditionally known for their cattle rearing. It is commonly found in the area of traditional Hallikar belt of so called Ramanagara, Mandya, Mysuru, Kolar, Hassan, Bengaluru rural and Tumkur districts of South Karnataka. Specially Ramanagara, Magadi, Kanakapura are mainly rearing of original breed characteristics. The choice of taking the bulls for breeding is mainly in Ramanagara district.

Hallikar breeds cattle are mainly suitable for drought conditions. And its main color of Grey Hair coated (rupayee Banna). It also contains the same 8 teeth and after cattle reaches the maturity of 2 and half years, 2 teeth will fall in the middle of tooth and it will regrow and next two teeth will fall side of the 2 teeth which as been regrown. Year to year there is a fall and regrowth of the teeth which signifies the age as naturally to other breeds commonly known. And after the regrowth of 8 teeth it will be lived for around 15 years.

Hallikar breed of cattle is the mother of all South Indian Breeds namely, Amruthmahal, Khillar, Kangayam, Krishna Valley, Pulikullam, Alaambadi, etc., and one more thing Hallikar also has the sub-breeds called Gunjamavu, Betadpura, Amaravathi, Sujimallige and Jala.

- The main passionate looking of Hallikar breed among sub-breeds is Sujimallige and this breed give a passionate look, endurance, power and speed. It waves around the height of approximately 5' 10"-6' feet. Its length around 1.5m-2m and the cow of this breed gives a lesser amount of milk compared to other breeds of Hallikar. This breed is mainly reared by the farmers for work, race and traditional family legacy carrying in their life.
- Gunjamavu, Betadpura breeds have another level of endurance in work and milk yield too, but it's growth is not equivalent to the Sujimallige breed of its length, height and size.
- Amaravathi Breed, it's brown in color, and it is as same as the characteristics of Gunjamavu and Betadpura. Its nose, horns and feet are partial brown in color and in the sense it indicates the purity of breed.
- Jala breed is also a breed rarely seen in Hallikar which contains of features like white colored hair patches on the grey haired covered body largely. It is quite similar to the above mentioned breed of its characteristics.
- Hallikar has one more breed of black color haired covered breed which is in search of his history of name and origin of Hallikar breed is going on. It is called 'cross breed' in local but it has the actual name and origin place specified to that breed also I guess.

Hallikar's main features of no extra skin waving bellow the neck (Gandagalu) of what other state breeds have and neck looks like horse neck and the horn roots are very thin compared to other breeds and sharp and

long head one which is mainly helpful for the protection of them. The horns will be filled with the color of white, black, and slightly red mud color according to their breeds features.

It is preferred with the white color of drops like picture on above the eyebrow. Legs are so strengthen to work passionately to his owner and dynamic looking hump is a major one and fore and hindquarters are dark in color. The specification of the breed suits the color based on features of horns, nose, eyes and hoop mainly.

Hallikar breed contain 5 types of color that is black, grey, white brown and white patches on any above color. Gradually Hallikar cattle breed color changes from time to time. It will be changing according to the climate of seasons of summer full shinny white and in rainy reason dark grey and winter season lightish grey according to the skin color.

- Majorly Cow of Hallikar breeds gets concieved (pregnant) in the month of October to March of 6 months of season for breeding. Bull and cow have the major eligibility to take breeding (mating) by bulls after 2 and half years from the birth time. Bull as the eligibility to do breeding after the fall of 2 teeth and regrowth, that gives the milage to breed till its death. This breed is mainly famous for drought condition and it is used for agriculture purpose. The main words to be remembered always that is “in this whole world no other breed cows will work except HALLIKAR breed” and that to in India, in Karnataka Hallikar cows used for agriculture works and it works faster than the bullocks.

Hallikar breed is so called as “South Indian Mother” because of the huge spread of Hallikar breed throughout the south Indian dynasty for its majestic speed, power, aggressiveness, look and energy. It is playing a vital role in race of south India. In Maharashtra, people are owning most Hallikar bulls for race as named Bail Pola, Bail Shariyat and the state contains Khillar, Krishna Valley too. In Tamil Nadu, Hallikar bulls are used for working in field and race of named Rekla, Jallikattu and this state also contains the breed of Kangayam, Pulikulam, Alambadi and Umblacherry. In Andra Pradesh there are mainly used for working and preferred for there speed in working compaired to Ongole bulls and active participation in races are held in Andra Pradesh also. And in Kerala, Hallikar Breeds cattle are mainly used for race and work too, but it is mainly used for race as named Maramadi, Kalapottu, and it contains vechur also they use this breed.

In Karnataka, Hallikar breed bulls of famous bloodline mainly are Dodda Basti stud bull Balarama and Hegnuur bloodline studbull from Yelgalli.

So, its clear to hear that Hallikar breed is the most effective breed in India serving all other states but other states breed are not encouraged in our state because we are having a top quality breed which can make other cattle breeds as subordinate and ours is supreme.

The use of Character Evidence in Indian Criminal Trials: A Study on Landmark Judgements

Introduction

Character evidence is crucial in Indian criminal proceedings, governed by Sections 53 and 54 of the Indian Evidence Act, 1872, where appraising the credibility and conduct of individuals is essential for establishing guilt or innocence.

This research article explores its evolution through a comprehensive analysis of significant judicial pronouncements, analysing admissibility criteria, probative value and fairness implications. It critically evaluates legal frameworks balancing evidentiary relevance with individual rights protection.

Character - Meaning

As given under the Indian Evidence Act, 1872 – ‘character’ includes both reputation i.e., general estimation in which one is held by the public and disposition i.e., inherent qualities of a person; but, (except as provided in section 54), evidence may be given only of general reputation and general disposition, and not of particular acts by which reputation or disposition were shown.

Legal Framework under the Indian Evidence Act, 1872

Section 53: Evidence of accused’s good character is relevant in criminal proceedings.

Section 53A: In sexual offences, where consent is a contentious issue, evidence regarding the victim’s character or previous sexual experiences is irrelevant.

Section 54: Evidence of the accused's bad character is irrelevant unless they have introduced evidence of their good character. This aligns with the Article 20(3) of the Constitution of India as considering the bad character of the accused person can lead to self-incrimination violating Article 20(3).

Section 155: Pertains to impeaching the credit of a witness by presenting evidence of their character.

Sections 146 and 148: Allow for questions that test the credibility of a witness by impeaching their character during cross-examination.

Landmark Judgements

1. HABEEB MOHAMMED V. STATE OF HYDERABAD

Habeeb Mohammad, former Revenue officer in Hyderabad was convicted for the crimes committed during communal violence in 1947. He challenged his conviction under Article 14 of the Indian Constitution, arguing that the Regulation under which he was convicted violated his right to equality before law. Though there is no explicit mention, there was an implicit consideration of character evidence within the broader context of criminal proceedings. The Court held that the understanding of a person's character in criminal cases is crucial for interpreting their conduct and determining their innocence or guilt. Actions performed by an accused can appear suspicious or innocent depending on their known character. Moreover, even when considering the appropriate punishment, individuals are permitted to demonstrate their overall good character.

The Court implicitly recognized the importance of character evidence. It stressed that understanding an accused's character is essential for interpreting their actions and assessing guilt or innocence. Additionally, demonstrated good character can influence the determination of punishment, featuring the significance of character evidence in criminal proceedings.

2. ARVIND KEJRIWAL V. ARUN JAITLEY AND ORS

In essence, this case is a defamation claim where Jaitley accused Kejriwal of damaging his reputation through statements. The defence Counsel, Ram Jethmalani, argued that Jaitley's reputation wasn't substantial enough to be significantly harmed. Jethmalani also differentiated between reputation and goodwill, asserting that damage to goodwill doesn't necessarily constitute defamation.

This case focuses on the importance of character evidence in defamation cases, where the credibility and public perception of individuals are critical to the court's assessment.

3. STATE OF PUNJAB V. GURMIT SINGH

This case revolves around an incident that took place in the state of Punjab, where a minor girl was abducted and raped by three men. The Court emphasized the importance of the testimony of a rape victim and also it expressed strong disapproval of the approach of the minor girl. It criticized the lower Court for unfairly stigmatizing the minor girl. It emphasized the importance of judicial restraint in such matters, highlighting the profound impact on the victim's future and broader societal consequences. The statement emphasises that discouraging victim and inadvertently encouraging criminals could lead to a society where crime is incentivized rather than deterred.

This case highlights the importance of judicial restraint in using character evidence in sexual offence cases. The Supreme Court criticized the lower Court for stigmatizing the victim, emphasizing that such actions harm the victim and society by discouraging victims and encouraging criminals.

4. PRAKASH V. STATE OF MAHARASHTRA

Prakash, a police officer and Sudhakar, a businessman coarsely entered Nirmala's house and forced Nirmala and her husband to sign few documents and raped Nirmala. The High Court acquitted Sudhakar and Prakash, concluding it wasn't rape, scrutinizing Nirmala's character to imply consent. On appeal to Supreme Court, it dismissed the idea of Nirmala's voluntary participation, stressing coercion's role in rape. This reversal highlights the need for careful and considerate use of character evidence, ensuring that justice is served without reinforcing societal prejudices for victim-blaming.

The case strengthens how character evidence, particularly assumptions about the victim's behaviour, can lead to misjudgements. It serves as a critical example in the study of character evidence in Indian criminal trials, showcasing both its potential for misuse and the judicial system's role in rectifying such misapplications.

These judgements led to the inclusion of Section 53A in the Indian Evidence Act through the 2013 Amendment, which bars the use of a victim's character or past sexual experiences as evidence in determining consent. This legislative change aims to protect victim's dignity and ensure fairer trials.

5. STATE OF RAJASTHAN V. SMT. KALKI AND ANR.

In Rajasthan, during a land dispute Kalki and her husband Amara confronted Poona at his home. Poona was struck with an axe by Kalki and died instantly. Kalki and Amara were convicted of murder and rioting with deadly weapons by the Sessions Judge. The Rajasthan High Court acquitted Kalki and Amara, citing the witness i.e., the defendant's wife, as highly interested and noting minor discrepancies in her testimony. On appeal to the Supreme Court, it overturned the acquittal, reinstating lifetime convictions for Kalki and Amara, emphasizing the need for impartial evidence evaluation. While the decision primarily focused on the guilt or innocence, character evidence also plays a role in sentencing. The Court's decision to impose life imprisonment on the respondents reflects how character assessments and the gravity of the offence influence judicial outcomes.

Overall, the case accentuates the importance of evaluating character evidence critically within the broader context of witness reliability, legal interest and intervention in criminal appeals.

6. LILLU V. STATE OF HARYANA

The appellant was convicted by the Additional Sessions Judge for committing offences of rape and criminal intimidation on Raj Bala, a fourteen-year-old girl. An appeal was filed before High Court where the same was dismissed. On appeal to the Supreme Court, it reaffirmed that in rape trials, the age and the consent of the victim are pivotal issues. Despite the victim being found habituated to sexual intercourse via the 'two-finger' test, the Court emphasized that such tests violate the rape survivor's right to privacy, dignity and physical integrity under Article 21 of the Constitution of India. The Court didn't delve deeply into the specific character of the victim but focused on the broader implications of the case on the rights of rape survivors.

This case reinforced the principles set out in the case of Gurmit Singh, reiterating that a woman's character is immaterial in cases of sexual violence.

Conclusion

This study examines significant Indian judicial decisions where character evidence played a pivotal role. From Habeeb Mohammed's case challenging his conviction during communal violence to defamation disputes like Kejriwal v. Jaitley, character evidence has been crucial in interpreting conduct and determining guilt or innocence. Gurmit Singh's case highlights the judicial restraint needed in sexual offence trials to avoid victim stigmatization. Prakash's case highlights the risks of misjudgement when character assumptions influence legal outcomes. These rulings influenced legislative changes like Section 53A of the Indian Evidence Act, aimed at safeguarding victim dignity. The judiciary's role in Kalki's case reaffirms the critical evaluation of character evidence in criminal appeals, emphasizing its impact on sentencing and justice. Lastly Lillu's case highlights the protection of rape survivor's rights under Article 21, reinforcing that a victim's character should not influence legal proceedings.

Overall, these cases illustrate the evolving role and ethical challenges of character evidence in Indian jurisprudence, aiming for fairer and more just legal outcomes.

In conclusion, while character evidence provides valuable insights, its application must navigate complexities of witness reliability, social biases and legal safeguards to ensure equitable justice delivery. As legal interpretations evolve, maintaining balance between evidentiary value and safeguarding individual rights remains paramount in fostering trust and fairness within the criminal justice system.

There was essay writing competition on 27th February, 2024, on the topic “The Evolving Role of the Constitution in a Changing Society.” The following are few of the essays.

TOPIC: “THE EVOLVING ROLE OF THE CONSTITUTION IN A CHANGING SOCIETY”

Constitution is the supreme law of the country. The constitution of India is the world’s longest and largest constitution. It is an written constitution, enacted by the Constituent assembly of India on 26th Nov 1949. The Constitution is a living document.

The Idea of Constitution was planted in the minds of Indians during the colonial period. The Constituent Assembly with the great contributions by Dr. B.R. Ambedkar drafted the constitution in the year 1950, but the question here is; Is the constitution still hand-in-hand with the 2023? Can the provisions of that time be permanent? Is there proper applicability in the current scenario? Hence, to answer this, we have special provisions of Amendment under article.368. Thus, we can remove, add, modify or update the constitution as per the demanding situations.

The provisions, ideas and principles laid down keeping in mind the medieval and colonial era might not be up to mark for the evolving modern era. Hence, the Constitution must also be upgraded with the change in time & society. The fact that Indian Constitution has 449 articles, 25 parts and 12 schedules is the best proof to showcase evolution; as it initially had 395 articles, 18 parts and 8 schedules.

There are amendments made as and then required by the society. For instance, we can not follow the evil practices of society even after knowing its affects. Hence, we must remove it from its root. The landmark cases like Keshavananda Bharati, M.C. Mehta case, Maneka Gandhi, Navtej Singh, Nirbhaya case and many more have laid down new principles for the evolving society. The Basic structure doctrine, Protection of environment, abolition of sati system, Dowry, untouchability, etc. have played the role of catalyst in the society. Provisions were made for women safety (Vishaka guidelines), child protection against exploitation, uniform civil code, article370, abolition of untouchability (on basis of discrimination on any grounds of sex, race, caste, place of birth), removal of right to property and inclusion of educational and cultural rights. Inclusion of the terms ‘socialist’ & ‘secular’ are all significant in the role of evolving societal aspects.

The provisions of today might not fulfill the needs of tomorrow hence, constitution is an anchor in the sea of social change. There are changes like homosexuality, marriages, sustainable development, regional development. LGBTQ+, linguistic aspects, educational, social, economic or political changes as per the running society.

Hence, we can conclude by saying that, change is the principle of society and so constitution must also be updated as per the demanding social life. And if the evolution of society causes dilemma, then constitution must play the role of compass and guide its people back to the right path.

THE EVOLVING ROLE OF THE CONSTITUTION IN THE CHANGING SOCIETY

Introduction:

Constitution is the Supreme law of each country. It lays down principles regarding organization, functions and powers of the government. It is a social and legal document. The Constitution of a country is kept alive by making amendments and changes to its provisions as and then required in order to meet the changing needs of the society. Constitution acts as a vehicle for the progress of a nation. A constitution that doesn’t adopt to new needs of the society eventually dies and will no longer be accepted by the people of the nation.

Evolving role of constitution in a changing society:

Indian constitution which was drafted over a period of 2 years, 11 months and 17 – 18 days was adopted on 26th November 1949 and was adopted and enforced nationwide on 26th January 1950. The original Indian

Constitution consisted of 395 Articles, 8 Schedules and 22 Parts. Overtime the constitution has evolved and today after making of over 100 amendments we have 448 Articles, 22 Parts and 12 Schedules.

The Constitution which was drafted after independence was as per the needs of the society which existed then and there exists a lot of distinction between the society of 1900s and that of the society of 21st Century. The Constitution which was finally drafted once the East India Company's rule ended surpassed The Great Charter Act, The Indian Councils Act, The Pitt India Act, Minto – Morley Reforms and The Indian Government Act and was drafted after a thorough study of various constitutions of the world by a Constituent Assembly consisting of 398 members and a Drafting Committee which was presided over by Dr. B. R. Ambedkar as its chairman. Dr. Rajendra Prasad was the President of the Constituent Assembly who later went on to become the President of India.

The Constitution which commenced in the year 1950 gradually evolved over time in various aspects such as the laws relating to women's rights. There were many laws that were enacted as per the need of the hour and demand of the people. Vishaka guidelines brought in provisions related to harassment of women in work places. The Maternity Leaves Act of 1961 gave way for women to take maternity leave and have a successful pregnancy. There were laws enacted related to labour laws and working hours of men. The Child Labour Act specified that children under 14 years of age are not subjected to work and if they're found to be working, then it is violative of law. Fundamental duties were enforced and included under Article 51-A as per the 42nd CAA. Though at the commencement of the Constitution the Preamble contained certain aspects of socialist and secularism, the 42nd CAA added the words 'Socialist' and 'Secular' in 1976 in the preface i.e the Preamble of the Indian Constitution and established the importance of having a socialist and secular approach. The values enshrined in the Preamble give a strong message as to how the Indian society is, was and will be. Overtime, with evolving societal needs there were changes made in Hindu Marriage Act, Inheritance Act and other provisions. The verdict related to Triple Talaq, not only makes Talaq (triple talaq) a punishable offence but also shows how with changing times the Constitution is evolving. Practice of untouchability which was abolished at the commencement of the Constitution not only provided platform for backward classes to feel respected and accepted but also it went on to provide reservations for the upliftment of these socially, educationally and economically backward communities through enactment of various provisions. There were originally 7 fundamental rights guaranteed but with amendments to the Constitution 'Right to property' is no more a fundamental right and now we have 6 fundamental rights. The verdict of Nirbhaya is a milestone in relation to Rape provisions and cases. Shreya Singhal V Union of India is a landmark judgment related to freedom of speech and expression. Apart from these, there were many amendments made to the Indian Constitution and it has been evolving over time to meet the changing needs of society. Dowry Prohibition Act and the IT Act that were brought in to curb the social evils and cyber related offences and the enhancement of the ambit of Article 21 from Right to life to include Right to livelihood, shelter and education and enactment and amendment of Citizenship Act of 1956 are the prime and classical examples that show the evolution of Indian Constitution that's been taking place from the day of its commencement to till date.

Conclusion: Constitution being the supreme law of the land has evolved overtime in order to meet the changing needs of the society through amendments, judicial interpretations etc. Comparison of the Constitution at the Commencement and the Constitution of today after amending it over 100 times clearly depicts how the bare document is still alive and has adopted to societal needs and changes.

Earlier women were not treated equally, they were not given rights, they were not even allowed to vote, but as the world changed, the people change, and the constitution being constitution also changed.

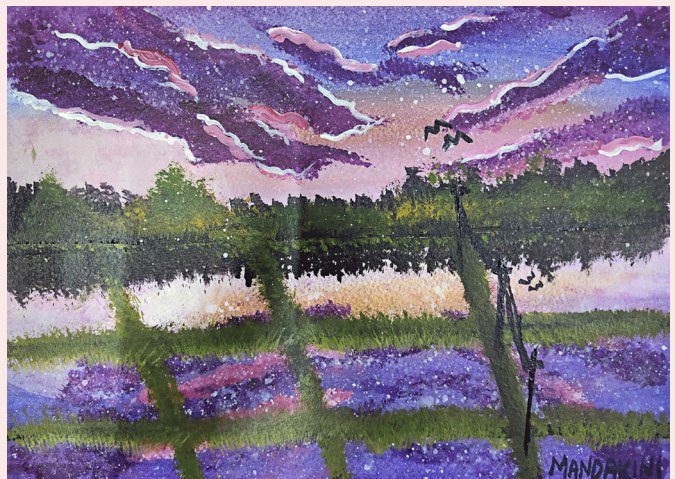
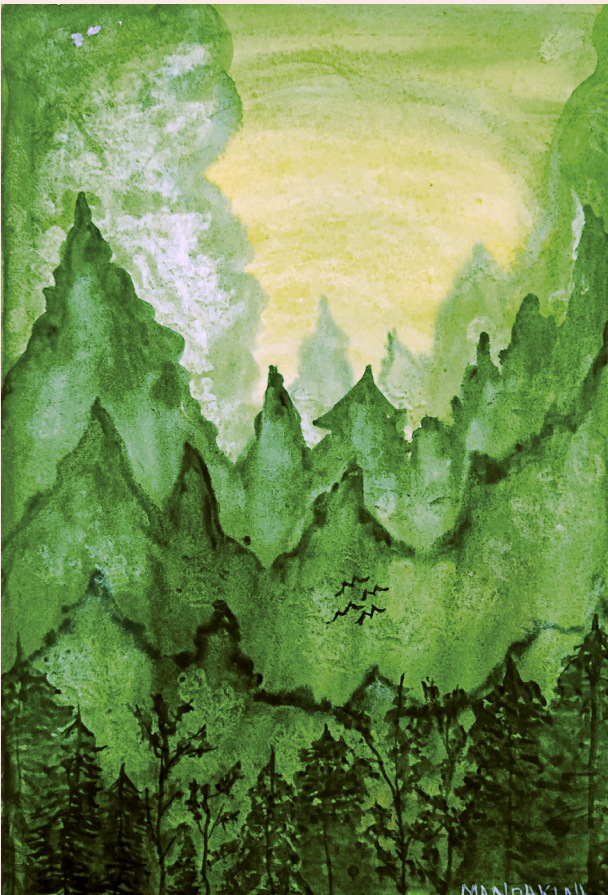
Conclusion
